


The mission of the Warren County Historical Society is to promote the history of Warren County, New York and its environs by supporting research and preservation efforts and encouraging public participation.





Turn Around, Bright Eyes: Henry Draper and the 1878 Eclipse by Tal Nadan, Manuscripts and Archives Division, Stephen A. Schwarzman Building August 18, 2017



The total solar eclipse which crossed from Alaska to Texas spurred many to make the trip West in 1878. As thoroughly documented in David Baron's recent book. American Eclipse, the U.S. scientific community was easer to demonstrate capability to the scholarly world. Dr. Henry Draper, a medical doctor and former chair of physiology at New York University, assembled a group who watched the eclipse from the railroad outpost of Rawlins, Wyoming Territory, Although professionally known for medicine, Draper was an enthusiastic amateur astronomer who built an observatory in Hastings-on-Hudson, New York. Henry Morton of the Stevens Institute of Technology, James Barker of the University of Pennsylvania, Draper's wife and research assistant Anna, and Thomas Edison comprised the eclipse-viewing party who departed New York on Saturday, June 13.



But in certain controlled circumstances, UV light can be used for good, as a recent CCAHA project shows.

A client brought in an 1854 indenture whose ink was highly faded. The document was large (15" x 24) and the fading rendered much of the text illegible. The client wanted a facsimile that was slightly smaller than the original and easier to display at home. In the process of examining the object, CCAHA staff members realized that the parchment might be a great candidate for a special procedure: UV photography.

"UV photography can sometimes help illuminate faded ink," says CCANA Manager of Digital Imaging Andrew Pinkham, who examined the indenture. "The wavelength picks up on aspects of the ink no longer visible to the naked eye."

Conservators carefully examined the piece using discrete amounts of UV light. "The results were dramatic," Pinkham says, "The faded text really popped." This encouraged the conservators to discuss the option of UV photography with the client. Using a UV light source, Pinkham could take a photograph that showed the text. The client agreed, and Pinkham combined this image with a conventional photograph, using Adobe Photoshop to produce an image that maintained the physical characteristics of the original but had legible text.

The resulting facsimile-printed on Hahnemühle Photo Rag 100% Cotton Inkjet Paper using pigmented inks -exceeded the client's initial request. Not only was the facsimile smaller and safe for long-term display, it showed much more of the original text.

The Armory Show took place from February 17 to March 15, 1913 at the 69th Regiment Armory on Lexington Avenue and 25th Street, and in just less than a month it changed the way Americans thought about modern art. It has been called the most important exhibition ever held in the United States.

The Armory Show was a stunning exhibition of nearly 1,400 objects that included both American and European works, but it is best known for introducing the American public to the new in art: European avant-garde

This pencil and label for "Thoreau's improved drawing pencils" is from a set of four (we also, have one) but is "for the nicest uses of the drawing master, surveyor, engineer, architect, and artists generally: Graduated from 1 to 4, in proportion to their hardness."

Do you require a box to store your supplies? You might find this one appealing – the Louis Maurer Archival Collection dating from 1850-1932 contains boxes (and as you can see, boxes of boxes!) of material. Pictured here is also a package of Charles Currier Lithographic crayons, No. 2 with the crayons and a label as well as the wooden toolbox; an inventory of the items contained can be found <u>here</u>.


