





Queens Name Explorer




Launched in October 2022 in collaboration with Urban Archive



STRATEGIC THEME 5:

Well Curated Collections

The library will maintain a collection that provides the community with reliable, authenticated sources of information that are diverse and inclusive.

OBJECTIVES:

- Continually evaluate print, audiovisual, and digital collections to determine the usefulness, timeliness, accuracy, and other criteria for keeping, adding to, or withdrawing from the collection.
 - Director will maintain circulation statistics for recent purchases to make sure materials selections satisfy and reflect patron and community needs and interests.
 - Director will explore cooperative contracts with vendors for new products, such as e-resources.
 - Director and staff will consider patron requests for the collection.
- Continue to digitize local history resources of interest and make them more accessible.
 - Director and staff will continue to work on digitizing materials in the Bennett Collection.

Bennett College Archives at the Millbrook Library





Founded in 1890, Bennett School for Girls found its home in Millbrook in 1907 at the site of a former luxury hotel. Renamed Bennett College after it discontinued high school grades, the school matriculated generations of students over its 90-year history, finally closing in 1978.


The Bennett College archive was donated to the library upon the school's closure.

Scope of Collection

The Millbrook Library houses a collection of historical material and memorabilia relating to Bennett College. Bennett College was founded in 1890 by May Friend Bennett as an educational institution for women and was in operation until 1978. The collection includes yearbooks, scrapbooks, photo albums, memorabilia, and various administrative documents relating to college operations.
